

The advent of Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) as the major sub-national institutions focused on leading local economic growth has been a major feature of the coalition's approach to economic development, and has generated a huge amount of interest and material.

I am particularly proud of a 'LEP trilogy' in April and May 2012 which looked at the roles and functions of LEPs and how they might respond to the 2012 Budget and publication of the final NPPF respectively:-

- March 2012 R&R 'Sugar and Spice and all things nice what is your LEP made of?'
- March 2012 R&R 'Making local economic sense of the budget...'
- April 2012 R&R '<u>Will LEPs rise to the NPPF challenge of building a strong competitive</u> <u>economy?</u>'

I have also made major presentations on LEPs for NLGN in 2011 and more recently at CURDS, University of Newcastle.

- March 2011 NLGN '<u>Towards LEP investment success lessons from RDAs and other</u> reflections'
- May 2012 CURDS '<u>The Year Two challenge for LEPs building and supporting strategic</u> economic leadership'
